INTRODUCTION

Housed in a distinctive pink, former convent, the Bunbury Regional Art Gallery (BRAG) is situated in the city centre of Bunbury, a two-minute stroll to the CBD to the east and the sparkling Indian Ocean to the west.

BRAG is the premier public art gallery in the South West of Western Australia. Boasting six formal exhibition spaces as well as community exhibition facilities, BRAG offers a diverse and stimulating program of exhibitions from regional, State and National sources.

The exhibition schedule is complemented by an extensive range of public programs, events, functions, classes and workshops. In addition to the gallery, the BRAG building is home to a purpose-built art studio, a dance studio and an exciting artist-inresidence studio that is to be launched later this year. These spaces ensure that BRAG plays host to a wide range of activities and events ranging from art and dance classes, and social events to seminars, and professional development workshops.

BRAG is an icon in the South West community with its federation gothic architecture and distinctive pink render. The original convent and its adjacent boarding and day school was designed by M.F and J.C Cavanagh and completed in 1898. In 1924 the Convent Chapel designed by F.W Steere was erected on the south side of the convent, in a design that was intended to complement rather than match. Over the years, a number of other buildings were constructed around these two buildings to accommodate the growing school and the nuns, but they were demolished when the city purchased the site in 1981. The remaining two buildings were redeveloped into the Bunbury Regional Art Gallery to a design by lan Molyneux. As part of the adaptation a link was constructed between the two buildings, creating lobbies and a staircase. The gallery opened to the public in 1987 with a grand gala opening. In 2011 a rear addition,

comprising a lift, storerooms and lift lobby was completed, making the building accessible to all.





From once hiring the old library behind the school of the Old Convent, now Studio 2, as a rehearsal space for a punk rock band formed in the early '80's, Simon Long's professional trajectory encompasses a series of significant milestones. Following a brief interlude for academic pursuits in Fine Art at W.A.I.T, now Curtin University, Long's artistic pursuits matured with musical performances in and around the gallery, including the Gallery's first Birthday celebrations in 1988.

Simon then began with the then Town of Bunbury in a casual position as a Regional Attendant soon after that, to what now seems to him like almost a lifetime ago.

That would be because it is a lifetime, being as a life sentence is a minimum of 20 years, at the least, 35 years could be considered almost two life sentences, but nevertheless that is the duration of Simon Long's incarceration within the walls and nun's cells at the Bunbury Art Complex, now Bunbury Regional Art Gallery, and formerly a Convent of the Sisters of Mercy.

Situated on Wardandi Noongar Boodja, one of the world's most important biodiversity hotspots, BRAG places a focus on exhibiting and collecting Aboriginal, ecological, and West Australian art. Further, the gallery is dedicated to supporting community-oriented artists, and to cultivating public scholarship, intellectual curiosity, and a creative local economy. All of this situates BRAG as the central hub for visual arts and culture in the South West Australia, and as a driver for sustainable communities of the future.

WONDERS OF THE WORLD | TONY WINDBERG

11 June '22 - 21 August '22

Images of antiquity - Roman ruins, Greek temples, the Pyramids and Petra - are resurrected from black and white photographs of century old volumes of Wonders of the Past. These combine with scenes of a wild terrain of sand and stone, a new frontier, the pristine landscapes of Mars. Windberg's innovative use of materials and techniques connects the artworks to his subject through a mix of traditional and non-conventional art materials. Iron oxides reflect the rustv hues of Mars, chalk and marble dust the limestone temples and pyramids. Surfaces and textures are methodically built up then 'weathered' to suggest the passage of time. In this thoughtprovoking exhibition of contrasts and contradictions, the rise and fall of empires reveals our strengths and weaknesses, our achievements and vulnerabilities. Human civilisation has built great monuments and achieved extraordinary heights as we look to other worlds. Do we have the power to save our own?

WALKING WITH THE ANCESTORS | ELAINE CLOCHERTY & CO

10 September '22 - 13 November '22

Walking with the Ancestors comprises of three projects, for which the artist

worked with Wardandi matriarch Vivian Brockman and daughter Mitchella Hutchins, amongst others of the Margaret River community. Centred around site specific artworks, the work Acknowledgement, looks at the artist's journey into "knowing one's own ancestors and culture to know another's" (Brockman-Webb) looking at key sorry stories in her own family history; Honouring focuses on water for life and relating to country, whereas Sorry Water was created to acknowledge and heal from the sorry stories so "we can walk together in unity to take care of Wardandi Country together" (Brockman-Webb).

ILUKA VISIONS

17 September '22 - 27 November '22

Iluka Visions showcases artworks created by students in years 7-12 from high schools across the South West region and serves to underscore the important role of art education in a holistic learning experience. In September 2022, 19 schools were participating in this survey of arts high school curriculum studies from Mandurah to Manjimup. BRAG is proud to be presenting a version of Iluka Visions since 1991. This time, 60 selections were made in person from almost 700 submissions.

A COLOURFUL LIFE ROBYN BISCHOFF

10 September '22 - 26 February '23

Robyn Bischoff has lived her life in full colour, with creative expression enabling her to navigate a lifetime of exploration, intuitiveness, and selfdiscovery. A delight in colour, line, space and texture is a common thread in her delicate, playful works, along with a deep love and concern for the environment. Robyn evokes the ancients, the solve et coagula of the alchemists, her paintings symbolically dissolve and recombine, transmitting their own consciousness to a higher state.

EPIC WORKS | SELECTIONS BY THE DIRECTOR FROM THE LIZ AND LLOYD HORN COLLECTION

20 December '22 - 6 March '23

Great art collectors are like master horticulturists, and a good art collection like a well-manicured garden. Since 1972, the Horns have been cultivating one of the most significant collections in Western Australia. While the quality of the work in the collection is outstanding, the collection is particularly notable for its focus: West Australian art. For this show, BRAG Director Michael Bianco has drawn on several themes he saw within the collection, namely abstraction, landscapes, and pop art.

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Selected for their scale, technique, and quality, he sees all the works as "epic" in some nature, and part and parcel of the Horns' heroic project of helping to establish a West Australian cannon.

THE LESTER PRIZE

25 March '23 - 28 May '23

Earlier this year, BRAG was delighted to host the renown Lester Prize for the first time. The Lester Prize for portraiture captures what it means to be 'them', to be 'me' and to be 'us. It exhibits all our traits, the heroic, the despicable, the humble, the deplorable, the principled and the fallen. When you look upon these portraits of others, you can't help but see yourself reflected.

BUNBURY BIENNALE 2023 -CULTURE/NATURE

2 April '23 - 5 June '23

Since its inception in 1993, the Bunbury Biennale has grown into a major art event and become an open platform for artists to present the latest trends in cutting edge contemporary art, pushing boundaries, exploring challenging concepts and stretching limits. The 2023 Bunbury Biennale was organised around the theme 'Culture/Nature', and a series of exhibitions invited the public to engage with a wide array of creative practitioners dedicated to critically engaging the environment in a myriad of ways.

NOONGAR COUNTRY 2023

17 June '23 - 24 September '23

Noongar Country, now in its 21st year, is an annual exhibition that celebrates culture by showcasing artwork made by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander artists living on Noongar Boodja - spanning from Geraldton to Esperance and encompassing 14 different dialects. This year, artists were asked to respond to the NAIDOC week theme, 'For Our Elders'. Exploring culture, the relationships between themselves and their community leaders, and stories that have been passed through moort for generations. This year saw 67 artists correspond to the theme, with a number of works

being chosen for acquisition for the City of Bunbury Art Collection. This exhibition would not be possible without the support of Alcoa.

GROUNDSWELL – ARTBACK NT

17 JUNE '23 - 20 AUGUST '23

Groundswell showcases a selection of powerful reactions with particular focus on the creeping changes to the Northern Territory's water supply. The exhibition charts these changes by grouping artistic responses thematically into the prevailing resource issues of Access, Contamination, Scarcity and Culture. Curated by Carmen Ansaldo, exhibited works extend through vast geographies, perspectives and artistic mediums to stake their claim. spanning visualised data to ceramics, oil painting to recycled sculpture and printmaking to stand-up comedy. The commonality however, is their shared determination to bridge the message of each individual artist to the collective shared concerns of the Territory's citizens.

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NOONGAR COUNTRY 2022 | KAARLA KOORT-AK: WOONYA, MOORT, BOODJA | HEARTS ON FIRE: LOVE, FAMILY, COUNTRY

Annual exhibition featuring artists living on Noongar Boodja.

PLAYING THE MAN | GRAHAM MILLER

Referencing bubble gum footy cards from the 1970's and 80's (and press images, including Rennie Ellis's iconic image of Robbie McGhie), Miller recreates himself as boyhood football heroes to explore issues of masculinity, identity and cultural difference.

MOTHERHOOD | SHEREE DOHNT

An exhibition featuring small-scale watercolour portraits of mothers from all over Australia, depicting the relationships of mother and child, and the joys, tensions, sadness and loss within those lifetimes of experience.

YIMARDOOWARRA | ARTIST OF THE RIVER, THE ART OF LOONGKOONAN

Paintings by one of Australia's oldest contemporary artists that are intricate depictions of her homeland in remote Western Australia.

COMPOUND EYES | MOLLY COY, ELEANOR DAVIES, RONA MIRTLE

A manifest of the artists' individual and combined interests, research and existing work relating to moths, bees & beetles, both real and imagined, to evoke interest, emotion and influence, by creating a range of thought provoking works.

COLLABORATIONS | COLLABORATION WA

Collaboration WA Inc. presents a collaborative exhibition featuring wood turners from all over Australia.

AND THERE WAS LIGHT

A City of Bunbury Art Collection exhibition focusing on the artists' use of light in their works.

BLOOMING ART

An annual exhibition presented by the Floral Designers' Club comprising of the South West Floral Championships and a number of floral masterpieces made by local celebrities in response to works from the City of Bunbury Art Collection.

IN PLACE | SOUTHWEST PRINTMAKERS

An exhibition about personal interpretations of the state of being In Place, creating conversation about it being an actual place, or the certainty of outcome.

Creative Connections

Creative Connections offers a supported, inspired environment for artists of all abilities. This weekly class faciltated by Nathan Gardiner is focused on extending cognitive and social connections through the arts and creating a safe space to support social interaction and camaraderie.

Creative Kids and Young Visions

With eight sessions per term, Creative Kids is BRAG's after school art classes for 6-8 year olds. Young Visions is BRAG's after school art classes for 9-11 year olds. Classes are taught by professional artist, Charlotte White, and each term includes a gallery tour and end of term exhibition. Each term focusses on a different theme and focus medium.

School Holiday Workshops

A variety of holiday workshops for school aged children, focussing on different skills and techniques.

Education Tours

BRAG provides guided and self-guided exhibition tours to all educational institutions and community groups.

Workshop Program

BRAG provides a service of bookable tutors for workshops that can be hosted at the gallery studio, or at a suitable premises. Tutors are all professional artists.

EXHIBITION SPECIFIC PROGRAMS

Workshop | From Drawing to Painting with Tony Windberg | 30 and 31 July 2022

In this unique two day workshop exhibiting artist, Tony Windberg, guided participants through his personal approach to turn a drawing into a painting.

Cinefest Oz Talk | Grace Slaven on Del Kathryn Barton's Australian Feminine Gothic | 27 August 2022

Following the launch of Del Kathryn Barton's feature film directorial debut, Blaze, this educational talk examined readings on Australian Feminine Gothic landscapes, the presence of ornamentation, and subsequent evocation of horror vacui (fear of empty space) within Barton's painting practice. Workshop Series | Watercolour Portraits with Sheree Dohnt | 8 and 15 August 2022

Sheree Dohnt conducted a watercolour portrait workshop series in conjunction with her solo exhibition Motherhood.

Professional Development | Arts Educators: Best Practice in the Arts Industry | 10 November 2022

BRAG's annual professional development morning program highlighted talks from industry professionals, with an afternoon workshop led by Ron Bradfield Jnr about a self-reflective practice and cultural mark-making.

Workshop Series | South West Printmakers: In Place | 26 November and 3 December 2022

Exhibiting members of the South West Printmakers, Christine Latham and Yvonne Dorricott, hosted workshops on the topics of monotype printmaking and drypoint etching. (pictured middle right)

Workshop | Free Expression in Acrylics with Robyn Bischoff | 28 January and 25 February 2023

In these popular workshops, Robyn encouraged participants to create an intuitive artwork using a combination of painting with acrylic and collage.

Art Teacher Sundowner | BRAG Education | 2 February 2023

Aimed at marking the start of the school year, BRAG hosted art teachers in the South West to launch the new bookable workshop program.

Tour | Tactile Tour with Robyn Bischoff | 15 February 2023

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

RETAIL SHOP

The opening of the new Noongar Arts Program BRAG retail space in January 2023, has seen NAP artists sales triple in a comparison of sales Jan to April 2023 with sales of the same time period in 2022.

MARKETS AND OTHER SALES

Externally to sales through BRAG, the successful facilitation of artists' markets at the Tree Street Art Safari, Stirling Street Art Market and the World Tourist Summit, Crown Casino. Perth saw NAP artists make sales from new products in silk, glass, paint, and print. The sale of art images for the City of Bunbury marketing banner project was a beautiful visual outcome for our program. The sale of published books to Wardandi Miya-K Kaadadjiny Aboriginal Corporation created an artist income we hadn't explored before in our products. The NAP Coordinator also worked with

artists and external local businesses on four public art commissions, and individual artist entries into external exhibitions in Perth and the South West of WA.

EXHIBITIONS

Four new emerging artists participated in the annual REVEALED Exhibition at Fremantle Art Centre.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

Ten artists travelled to Geraldton in October, to participate in a statewide Arts Forum facilitated by the Aboriginal Art Centre WA. The collaboration, networking and professional development opportunities was outstanding.

Arts Law facilitated a legal workshop to upskill artists to navigate the contracts and language around the arts industry we are immersed in.

PROJECT HIGHLIGHTS

MEETING PLACES

With a project lead position created through NAP, Artist Dellas Bennell directed four films in partnership with LOMAX media, *Meeting Places Our Stories in Art*, a collection of short films telling the stories behind four Aboriginal women working within the arts on Wardandi Country. The premiere night was held at the Bunbury Regional Entertainment Centre, with the 240 seat cube theatre booking out immediately, which created an incredible stand out highlight for the year.

DJOOROODIBINY

The Noongar Arts Program facilitated well-being workshops with the South West Aboriginal Medical Services, Djooroobidiny (Go along happily). These were well received and rich in enjoyment.


NGANLANG BIBOOL | LANGUAGE BOOKS

It was exciting and fruitful to work collaboratively with Charmaine Councillor, Noongar language linguist of Wardandi Miya-K Kaadadjiny Aboriginal Corporation, to publish four local Wardandi written and illustrated children's books. NAP facilitated writing and illustration workshops to NAP artists and from these, four artists launched their books in early 2023. 

ART COLLECTION

In the late 1940s, the West Australian philanthropist, Sir Claude Hotchin donated significant artworks to towns across Regional Western Australia. His aim was to bring art to the people of the South West region and to encourage local artists.

In 1948, the then Town of Bunbury received the first of 22 works donated by Sir Claude Hotchin. This donation became the start of the Bunbury Art Collection and a committee was established to manage the Collection. From 1948 until the early 1950s, the Society of Artists managed and acquired works for the Collection, until the Collection Committee was established under the Local Government Act. From then until they disbanded in 2009, the Society of Artists had been represented on the Committee.

In 1979, the City of Bunbury purchased the old Convent of Mercy to permanently house and exhibit the Collection and to provide the community with an 'A' Class Gallery that became the Bunbury Regional Art Galleries.

In 2008 the City of Bunbury Art Collection Committee accepted a generous gift of 21 artworks donated by Alcoa of Australia. Many of Australia's most prominent artists are represented in the Alcoa Gift.


A collection of 330 botanical watercolour paintings by Bunbury artist Rosetta Kelly (1861–1961) were purchased in 2010. The works were painted between 1916 and 1940 and are of significant local historical interest.

From those 22 works donated in 1948, the Collection has since grown to over a thousand pieces. The estimated value of the collection is in excess of \$2 million.


